


Professor Clive Williams MG



Clive Williams had an early career background as an officer in Australian Military Intelligence, which included overseas intelligence postings in Hong Kong, the US and UK. After leaving the Army in 1981, he initially started as a civilian in Defence's Strategic and International Policy Division. After one year in Defence policy, he managed to extricate himself and resumed his intelligence career in Defence Intelligence.

During 1990-1993 he was the Defence Intelligence Attaché in Washington which was the Gulf War period. During 1993-1995 he was Director of the Defence Imagery Exploitation Centre, the forerunner organisation to the Australian Geospatial-Intelligence Organisation. His last Defence appointment 1998-2002 was Director of Security Intelligence, which included responsibility for running high-level security investigations.

At various times he has worked with ASIO, ASIS, CIA, DIA and MI6.

In 1998 he was belatedly awarded the Medal for Gallantry (MG) for an infantry action as a platoon commander in the US 173rd Airborne Brigade in South Vietnam in 1965.

In 2002, Clive started as an academic at the ANU's Strategic and Defence Studies Centre running Masters courses in protective security, intelligence, terrorism and counterterrorism. These courses were also run at many Australian universities and at universities in the US, Taiwan, Japan and Indonesia. He has also worked at ADFA and Macquarie University, and at the Centre for Military and Security Law at the ANU. He has worked in every Southeast Asian and South Asian country except for Laos and Bangladesh and worked for NATO in Afghanistan in 2009 and 2012.

Clive has travelled widely since 2002 in Albania, Belarus, Bulgaria, China, Cuba, Egypt, Iran, Israel, South and North Korea, Lebanon, Romania, Russia, Serbia, Turkey, Ukraine and all the countries along the old Silk Road.

Clive is a Distinguished Life Member of the International Association of Bomb Technicians and Investigators, a Member of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, a Member of the Australian Institute of Professional Intelligence Officers, a Life Member of the Royal United Services Institute, a Member of the International Academy of Investigative Psychology and an Honorary Life Member of the RSPCA. He is also a Life Governor of the Australian Intelligence Corps Trust Fund.

He currently runs a Canberra-based consultancy and works part of the year in the UK with the Royal Marines and Cambridge University.
